



The RPUMC Youth Group is working hard to ensure that youth of all ages are ministered to and provided with the tools they need to grow in their relationship with Christ and one another. The youth group meets once a week for meetings on Sunday evenings from 5:30 - 7:30 p.m. Meetings include recreational time, Bible study/lesson time, dinner, music, and prayer time. We also like to supplement weekly meetings with theatrical experiences, bowling nights, hayrides, etc., as appropriate throughout the year. Additionally, we support the God's Little Angel's mission group and attend those activities on Saturdays every six weeks or so, as well participate in at least one mission project of our own during the school year. The youth have three "big" trips that they will participate in this year. One is to the Salvation Army's Camp Ladore in the Pocono Mountains. The weekend will be a retreat focused on learning to be thankful. The second trip will be to Ocean City, MD for the Peninsula-Delaware Conference Youth Rally. Our third will be to Camp Pecometh for another retreat weekend. The youth participate in the weekly worship service by serving as nursery workers, greeters, ushers, acolytes, readers and, occasionally, the sound and video crew. Training was provided to the youth in all of these areas at the beginning of the year. The youth also participate in worship through movement activities, drama, and music throughout the year, as well as put on a fully "youth-led" worship service in the spring. Additionally, there may be an opportunity over the summer for youth to attend a mission trip to Farmington, ME with our friends from Red Clay Creek Presbyterian Church.

KIDS' KORNER & GOD'S LITTLE ANGELS Kristi J. Doughty



We're thankful all year round for the blessings God has given us, and for the opportunity to share God's lessons and love with the children and youth .

Here are the topics for November:

<u>Pre-Kindergarten/K</u> – focusing on Daniel to teach how God watches over us when we're away from home (Daniel and his friends are forced to move to Babylon); God watches over us at school (Daniel and his friends at the King's court); God watches over us when we're scared (Daniel helps the King understand his dream); and God watches over us all the time (God watches over Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego).

<u>Grades 1-3</u> – also focusing on the book of Daniel to teach us how God helps us to make the right choices (Daniel refuses to eat tainted food); God helps us stand up for what's right (Daniel's friends refuse to bow to idols); God deserves credit for all good things (Nebuchadnezzar learns to praise God); and We should follow God no matter what happens (God rescues Daniel in the lions' den).

<u>Grades 4–6</u> – focusing on Proverbs 3: 5-6 what do I do when the pressure's on? Including standing up for my faith (what if I'm the only one saying no?); Not compromising my values (what if saying yes makes me popular?); making God-honoring choices (would Jesus fit in with my friends?); and accepting my faith (what if being a Christian makes me unpopular?).

<u>Grades 7–12</u> - will continue with "Believe It or Not!" stories from the Bible: Amazing God: Ezekiel's vision (God's glory is beyond our comprehension); Dead bones rise: the valley of dry bones (God alone brings us life); a Marriage with a message: Hosea's marriage (God is faithful); Sight and salvation: Jesus places spit on a blind man (God makes us whole); and fallings and failings: Eutychus' fatal nap (God is full of grace).

GOD'S LITTLE ANGELS

On October 18, 2008 God's Little Angels had a great time cooking up a storm! We made two batches of chocolate chip cookies, lasagna and a delicious chicken casserole for the Ronald McDonald House folks. After sharing a yummy lunch of make-it-yourself pizzas and salad, we delivered the baked goods and items donated by the congregation, as well as items purchased using the donations collected in church totaling \$143.18 (including Beanie babies), to the RM House and got the grand tour. What a wonderful organization to help the families of children receiving care at AI DuPont hospital. We had a nice group of about 18 folks. Thanks to all the children, youth and parents who helped, and special thanks to Sarah Pasmore who generously chose the recipes, bought the ingredients, and even started some of the cooking! What is all Saints Day? The Feast of All Saints is a holy day of the Church honoring all saints, known and unknown. The vigil of the Feast (the eve) has grown up in the US as a festival in itself, <u>All Hallows Eve</u>, or Halloween. While many consider Halloween pagan, as far as the Church is concerned the date is simply the eve of the feast of All Saints. Many customs of Halloween reflect the Christian belief that on the feast's vigils we mock evil because, as Christians, it has no real power over us. Various customs have developed related to Halloween. In the Middle Ages, poor people in the community begged for "soul cakes," and upon receiving these doughnuts, they would agree to pray for departed souls. This is the root of our modern day "trick-or-treat." The custom of masks and costumes developed to mock evil and perhaps confuse the evil spirits by dressing as one of their own. Some Christians visit cemeteries on Halloween, not to practice evil, but to commemorate departed relatives and friends, with picnics and the last flowers of the year. The day after All Saints day is called <u>All Soul's Day</u>, a day to remember and offer prayers on behalf of all of the faithful departed.

History of a favorite hymn for All Saints Day, "*Amazing Grace*", by John Newton.¹ He was born in London 1725. His mother, despite fragile health, was devoted to nurturing John's soul. After her death, John went between boarding school and the high seas. He joined the British Navy and deserted. He was flogged. His thoughts were of suicide. Early in 1748, he was rescued by a sea captain who had known John's father. John Newton ultimately became captain of his own ship, one which was used for slave trade.

On a homeward voyage, while he was attempting to steer the ship through a violent storm, he experienced what he was to refer to later as his "great deliverance." He recorded in his journal that when all seemed lost and the ship would surely sink, he exclaimed, "Lord, have mercy upon us." Later in his cabin he reflected on what he had said and began to believe that God had addressed him through the storm and that grace had begun to work for him.

For the rest of his life he observed the anniversary of May 10, 1748 as the day of his conversion, a day of humiliation in which he subjected his will to a higher power. "Thro' many dangers, toils and snares, I have already come; 'tis grace has bro't me safe thus far, and grace will lead me home." He continued in the slave trade for a time after his conversion; however, he saw to it that the slaves under his care were treated humanely.

His original title for this hymn was not "Amazing Grace" but Faith's Review and Expectation" based upon his study of 1 Chronicles 17:16-17: "King David...said: ' Who am I, O Lord God? And what is my house, that You have brought me this far? And yet...You have spoken of Your servant's house for a great while to come, and have regarded me according to the rank of a man of high degree...".

Below is a forgotten verse of this hymn you might consider singing:

The earth shall soon dissolve like snow, the sun forbear to shine;

but God, Who called me here below, shall be forever mine.

Newton met George Whitefield, deacon of the Church of England, and Newton became an enthusiastic disciple.² He met and admired John Wesley, the founder of Methodism. Newton was persistent in becoming a minister. He was ordained by the Bishop of Lincoln. His weekly sermons packed the church and resulted in the needed additions to the church building. Among Newton's contributions which are still loved and sung today are "How Sweet the Name of Jesus Sounds" and "Glorious Things of Thee Are Spoken," as well as "Amazing Grace." These hymns were published by poet William Cowper (Newton met him while in Olney) in 1779. The published book contained 68 pieces by Cowper and 280 by Newton.

In 1780, Newton left Olney to become rector of St. Mary Woolnoth, St. Mary Woolchurch, in London. There he drew large congregations and influenced many, among them William Wilberforce, who would one day become a leader in the campaign for the abolition of slavery. Newton continued to preach until the last year of life. He was blind. He died in London December 21, 1807.

UPDATES AT RICHARDSON PARK UMC WINTER PROGRAM

Green Day Comes To RPUMC

Beginning November 3, 2008, Mondays will be our designated "Green Day" at Richardson Park Church. Every Monday, the church office will be closed and most, if not all, the church utilities will be shut down to conserve energy and reduce our environmental footprint. This effort will ultimately help keep the Earth "Green" and also save the church some "\$Green\$". Good stewardship is not limited to simply smart use of our financial resources but wise use of all of creation.

Church Temperature Standards

Another energy conservation method to be implemented this winter is the practice of setting the church thermostats a little lower during the heating season. The agreed upon temperature standards are as follows:

Occupied Church Rooms – Set Manual Thermostat at 68 degrees or less Unoccupied Church Rooms – Set Manual Thermostat at lowest setting ~55 degrees Occupied Sanctuary – Automatic Thermostat set at 68 degrees Unoccupied Sanctuary – Automatic Thermostat will move to no lower than 62 degrees (less temperature swing required in this area to maintain organ tuning and operation)

Every degree the thermostat is set back can save as much as 2% in heating costs. If you are holding a class or sponsoring an event at the church, your help is needed to adhere to these temperature standards and remember to turn back the manual thermostats during cleanup, before leaving and locking up.

Also, you may want to bring a sweater or wear warmer clothing to church on very cold days. Remember, God doesn't care what we wear to church, but God does care that we come to church for Worship and Fellowship.

Do you need a little pick me up sometimes? Need a spiritual lift now and again?

There is a locally based Christian Radio Station, REACH, 89.1 FM that calls itself "radio with a purpose." It plays uplifting praise and prayerful music selections with scripture readings sprinkled in between. It can be a blessing to tune in when you just need a little inspiration to help you through your day. Check it out sometime.
