It's back to school time and boy do we have some surprises and exciting plans for our Sunday School classes! We'll begin September 14, 2008 at 9:00 a.m. First I'll introduce you to our new line up of teachers and grade levels:

PreK/K	Sarah Pasmore & Michelle Anderson
Grades 1-3	Marlene Johnson & Donna Chambers
Grades 4-7	Rob Anderson & Joe Tucker
Grades 8-12	Kristi Doughty and Annette Ott

Here are the topics for September:

Pre-Kindergarten/K – focusing on Genesis to teach us how God wants us to be kind and tell the truth. Joseph receives a special coat; Reuben tries to be kind to Joseph; and Joseph's brothers lie about his disappearance.

Grades 1-3 - David serves in King Saul's court (God wants us to respect our leaders); David spares King Saul's life (God doesn't want us to seek revenge); and David responds to God's promise (God wants us to thank and praise him).

Grades 4-7 - Rob and Joe will be using brand new materials called **Grapple** which will teach lessons thru videos, games and even an on-line community at **MyGrapple.com** for the kids to safely access which will give clues about upcoming lessons, discussion starters, games, polls for the kids to vote about what activities they want to do in future lessons, a forum, and a place to create their own profile!

Grades 8-12 - will start by looking at some "**Believe It or Not**" stories from the Bible: An unusual messenger: Balaam's Donkey (God knows our hearts); Forgiving God, Forever Loyal: Ehud and the Fat King (God forgives) and Using the Unexpected: Joel and the Tent Peg (God can use anyone!). We'll have video clips and games to keep things interesting!

Our last God's Little Angels project from the spring, planting the Wesley Tower Garden, has grown and bloomed, a tangible reminder of how God's love grows when we share it with others - - the ultimate mission of GLA. Look for upcoming details in next month's Messenger about a visit to the **Ronald McDonald House** in October and other fun activities.

RPUMC Financial Update

As we all make adjustments to our own personal budgets to counteract the effects of increased oil prices and negative economic influences, it is important to understand how the church is impacted by these conditions. Although this year's budget included estimated utilities costs and routine expenditures, some unpredicted expenses were incurred last month that have left available funds very low. Moving expenses for the Pasmore family, a part for the parsonage heater, repair of the parsonage air conditioning system, the fence installation and a new air conditioner for the music director's office totaled about \$5,700. Replacement of a section of flat roof and some soffit repair on the church are items still needed to correct leak issues but the expected cost has not yet been determined.

Increased utility costs will continue to put a heavy burden on our finances. Did you know that the average cost for gas and electric for the church alone is about \$2,500 a month? During the height of the heating season, the Delmarva Power bill for the church can rise to as high as \$3,400. And this year we expect to see increases in costs for all utility bills.

Contributions are down slightly as is usually the case over the summer months, but we are confident that our congregation will meet its financial commitments to the church in the months that follow. On a positive note, all but \$10,000 of our Apportionments have been paid for 2008.

Many cost-savings initiatives are being explored and initiated along with some creative fundraising activities. However, your continuing prayers, ideas, and ongoing financial support are a critical part of the church's financial success. We will continue to work through these financially difficult times with the faith that God will guide us and allow our church to thrive as it has for over 100 years.

Music Notes

According to the calendar, the summer is almost over. The kids go back to school and regular choir rehearsals resume. Both handbells and chancel choir rehearsals begin on Thursday, September 4th: 6:30 for bells and 7:30 for choir. Recently, a new choir member joined and told me "I feel more connected to God and to the church being part of the choir, even if I can't read music." Try one or two rehearsals. Come when you can, Praise Him every time in prayer and in song.

Upcoming Events –Save the date on your calendar

The International Year of the Organ is starting on October 19, 2008 at 7:00 pm. Dr. Gordon Turk will be featured on RPUMC's 57 rank pipe organ as our concert artist. Listed below are questions frequently asked. Perhaps they may help you to know more about the "king of instruments."

What is a rank of pipes? Every rank (a group of pipes encompassing every note on the keyboard) produces a different sound or pitch according to its construction. Sometimes a trumpet, oboe, flute or violin sound can be created

Why is a pipe organ so unique? The pipe organ is a musical instrument that produces sound when pressurized air (wind) is driven through a series of pipes, controlled by a keyboard. We have four keyboards plus a pedal board: Solo, Swell, Great, Choir and Pedals.

Why are more keyboards created, you only have two hands? Various sounds on each keyboard or manual can be created to make music sound like an orchestra (Great manual), or violin singled out as a soloist (Solo manual). The many keyboards allow an organist to be creative with the music, sound and expression.

How do you use your feet to play? Both feet with heels and toes are used. The written music determines left or right foot and heels or toes. Organist will train for many years to perfect their craft using their hands and feet. **For example:** A hymn contains four parts of music. The top two notes are played with your right hand. The lowest two notes are split: the top note by your left hand and the bottom note by your foot (left or right, heel or toe).

What can I do to help? The organ is truly a wonderful instrument to hear and play. I encourage everyone to be a disciple about the upcoming concert. Talk to family and friends to come to the concert. Post colored flyers at your place of business and talk about it during lunch with co-workers. Take flyers to retail stores where you shop and ask to post the black and white or colored flyers. Invite the community to RPUMC and hear the King of Instruments!

You can make a copy of the enclosed flyer or outside the office, above the water fountain, there are copies of the same flyer on yellow paper. If you are able to post the flyers, please be kind and remove them after the concert. **The goal is to PACK the Church with the community! Share in Christ's fellowship.**

CHURCH COUNCIL DIGEST

The August Church Council Meeting on Sunday, August 17 was our first scheduled meeting this summer. Vacation and Sandy's mother's illness forced the cancellations. We have had to dip into special fund categories to keep up to date. That also would indicate that there is no "extra" coming in to help with non-recurring expenses such as roof leaks and a/c problems. As we await the planned Stewardship Campaign Pastor Tom is planning, let us look at where we are in our pledge to RPUMC and bring it up to date if needed.

As in most households, thrift and energy conservation will be the mode we will be in for the foreseeable future and I urge your cooperation in helping to achieve them. Follow-up and announcements of specific plans and events will be elsewhere in the messenger. We continue to be a "Happenin' Place" and need everybody's help to be successful.

It won't be long now before the Nominations group will be meeting to form the class of 2009 and beyond. Please give thought to how and where you can serve.

John works as an electrician so he was asked to look at the flood light on the outside of the parsonage.
