MUSIC NOTES Terri Weaver, Director



One of my favorite hymns is "It is Well With My Soul". The melody was written by Philip Bliss and words by Horatio Spafford. The story behind this hymn is a very interesting tale I'd like to share with you.

Horatio was an attorney in Chicago during the great fires that consumed the city in 1871. He lost a fortune due to heavy investments in real estate. His only son, who was four, died of scarlet fever the same year. He poured himself into helping rebuild the city and helping 100,000 who were left homeless.

In 1873, he decided to take his wife and four daughters to Europe on a vacation and an evangelist meeting in England. An urgent matter detained Horatio, but he decided to send his wife and four daughters on the *Ville du Havre*, a luxurious French liner.

During the late hours of November 22, 1873 as the ocean liner glided over smooth seas, passengers were tossed from their bunks. The ship collided with an iron sailing vessel and was taking on water. With screams and prayers, passengers submerged into icy waters. In two hours the *Ville du Havre* vanished into the black waters with 226 fatalities including Horatio's four daughters. Mrs. Spafford was found clinging to wreckage nearly unconscious. When the 47 survivors landed in Cardiff, Wales she cabled her husband: "Saved Alone."

He immediately booked passage to join his wife. On a cold December night, the captain called him and said "I believe we are passing over the place where the *Ville du Havre* went down." Spafford went to his cabin and could not sleep. He said to himself, "It is well; the will of God be done." He later wrote the hymn based upon those words.

The melody for "It is Well with My Soul" was originally titled **Ville du Havre**, and written by Philip Bliss. In 1876 he and his wife boarded a train to Ohio to sing at a Tabernacle. As the train crossed a ravine, the trestle bridge collapsed. The engine reached solid ground but the passenger cars plunged down the ravine. Bliss was tossed from the car, but his wife was still inside under the twisted metal. The other survivors urged him not to try to go into the flaming wreckage. He was quoted as saying "If I cannot save her, I will perish with her." Both Philip and his wife died in December 1876.

These tragedies relating to one hymn can help show us how to pray in song and steady us when we are weary. Perhaps the text of this hymn will help you!

"The Trustees' Times"

<u>Members of the Congregation</u> While this year seems to have been relatively quiet to this point as far as major problems or issues go, I assure you the members of the Trustees have been reviewing and addressing some critical issues in order to stay within or below our anticipated budget. One of our focuses has been to review contracts for the various services rendered to our church to see if we could enhance the services while trying to save money. We performed our annual review of the insurance policy and deleted some non-critical or redundant items. To keep some of the energy bills on a more even keel throughout the year, we are now on a budget plan with Delmarva Power, and of course we continue with our Green Day which was enacted by last year's Trustees. We have switched the size of our trash dumpster to a larger unit, which decreases the amount of our pick-ups from a weekly to bi-weekly basis. This will save approximately 25% off of our trash bill due to decreased fuel and environmental charges and was championed by Kathy Russell.

We recently reviewed our cleaning services contract and had three competitive bids; the decision was made to continue with our current contractor based on price and service. We are in the process of signing a service contract for annual cleaning and maintenance on our air-conditioning and boiler systems which we hope will prolong their life cycles. The Trustees are also about to engage the services of a roofing contractor to do some much needed roof repairs. The flat roof over the landing room has been leaking for some time. It needs to be taken off and a new rubber roof installed. The upper roof parapet walls need to be resealed because it appears to be leaking down and through the center of the roof.

Right now, on paper, with the cost of the roof repairs and air conditioning maintenance contract, the Trustees are still able to be within our proposed budget. While this is and sounds like good news, we as a church still need to secure the actual dollars to make this and other upcoming necessities happen. I am hoping that you will somehow be able to make a special contribution to our cause. In the upcoming weeks, if you are so able, please make out a check to RPUMC and note roof repairs on the memo line. Any amount you contribute to this cause is greatly appreciated and will continue to allow us all to enjoy this facility.
