


Richardson Park United Methodist Church
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That's why I decided not to make another visit that could only be painful to both of us. If by merely showing up I would put you in an embarrassingly painful position, how would you then be free to cheer and refresh me? That was my reason for writing a letter instead of coming—so I wouldn't have to spend a miserable time disappointing the very friends I had looked forward to cheering me up. I was convinced at the time I wrote it that what was best for me was also best for you. As it turned out, there was pain enough just in writing that letter, more tears than ink on the parchment. But I didn't write it to cause pain; I wrote it so you would know how much I care—oh, more than care—love you!

- 2nd Corinthians 2:1-4 (the Message)

I looked out my window this morning and it was raining. Not just a heavy dampness or a light mist, but a full out Southern Baptist downpour. It was raining so hard that anyone being received into the church this morning would have been baptized by immersion. I had to put up my umbrella and don my raincoat just to keep from getting soaked on my way over to church from home. Monsoon season seems to have hit Delaware. To be truthful, I do not like rainy days. I do not like getting wet. I do not like having to drag a coat or umbrella with me wherever I go. I do not like green eggs and ham, oh, wait that's an entirely different story . . . In the immortal words of the late, great Karen Carpenter, "Rainy days and Mondays always get me down."

As I have reflected on my gloomy, dismal impression of rainy days, two important realizations have occurred to me. First, in the immortal words of the great John Fogerty, "As long as I remember, the rain's been coming down," and as far as I can tell the rain will keep coming down well into the future. I have no control over whether it's sunny or rainy. Jumping up and down and crying out to God about the unfairness of rainy days in my life will not change the weather. All I can do is control what I have control over: my


own behavior. Feelings are what they are, and I will probably never like rainy days, but I don't have to mope around or act miserable just because it's raining. I can choose to embrace life and live it to its fullest even in the midst of a deluge. In the immortal words of the late, great Reinhold Niebuhr, "God grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change; courage to change the things I can; and wisdom to know the difference."

The second realization is just as important as the first. In my own not so immortal words, "Just because something is painful doesn't mean that it is bad or wrong, and just because something feels good doesn't make it right." We as a culture have gotten caught up in this idea that pleasure equates to correctness. The better something feels the more right it must be. There is nothing more toxic to society than an understanding of life that seeks to maximize pleasure. Philosophers call this way of thinking Hedonism, and it can be extremely self-destructive. It privileges oneself over others. It is constantly seeking the next "high." It denies the reality that pain is as much a part of life as pleasure is. These teachings are in direct opposition to what the New Testament says life is all about. In the immortal words of our Savior, Jesus the Christ, "Anyone who does not take his cross and follow me is not worthy of me. Whoever finds his life will lose it, and whoever loses his life for my sake will find it." The pathway to God includes both pain and pleasure. It's when we seek to live a God-centered life that we realize Jesus uses both good and bad experiences in our lives to call us closer to him. Without the rain, nothing would grow and the earth would be devoid of life. As much as I dislike rainy days, I know they are vital and necessary to the sustenance of God's creation.

I leave you this month with the immortal words of one of my favorite authors, Anonymous, "Into every life a little rain must fall."

COMMUNITY ACTION PROGRAM (CAP)





MUSIC NOTES

A version of **The Hallelujah Chorus from Messiah, by George Frederick Handel** (1685-1759), was presented by the Chancel Bells on Easter Sunday. The history of this oratorio is very interesting and listed below are a few facts I thought you may want to know.

What is an oratorio? Bibles were expensive and most people were uneducated, so oratorios were created to take the text of the Bible and put it to music.

On what text of the Bible is this based? The Oratorio dramatizes the two events of Christ. First, when he appeared as the Lamb of God for the sin of the world (John 1:29), and second, when he shall again appear to set up on earth the Kingdom of his Father and to reign at Jerusalem over a world at peace (Acts 1:11; 3:19-21; Rev. 1:7; Jer. 3:17; Luke 1:32-33). But the Hallelujah Chorus is drawn from Rev. 19:6, 16 and chapter 11:15.

Why did Handel write this oratorio? While in London, Handel suffered a stroke (1737) and was losing his sight in one eye. Paralysis in his right arm prevented him from performing. He lost a fortune in writing music for operas that were not successful. He drove himself relentlessly to recover from one failure after another, and finally his health began to fail. By 1741, he was swimming in debt. It seemed certain he would land in debtor's prison.

Who influenced him to compose? A wealthy friend, Charles Jensen, gave Handel a libretto based on the life of Christ taken entirely from the bible. He also received a commission from a Dublin charity to compose a work for a benefit performance.

How long did it take Handel to compose this oratorio? Handel set to work composing on August 22 in his little house on Brook Street in London. He grew so absorbed in the work that he rarely left his room, hardly stopping to eat. Within six days, part one was completed. In nine days more, he had finished part two, and in another six, part three. The orchestration was completed in another two days. In all, 260 pages of manuscript were filled in the remarkably short time of 24 days. Handel never left his house for those three weeks. A friend who visited him as he composed found him sobbing with intense emotions. Later, as Handel groped for words to describe what he had experienced, he was quoted as saying "whether I was in the body or out of my body when I wrote it I know not."

How did the Hallelujah Chorus portion affect Handel? The composer, tears streaming down his face, turns to his servant and cries out, **“I did think I did see all Heaven before me, and the great God Himself.”** George Frederic Handel had just finished writing a movement that would take its place in history as the Hallelujah Chorus.

Tell me about the performance of Messiah... Messiah premiered on April 13, 1742 as a charitable benefit, raising 400 pounds and freeing 142 men from debtor's prison. A year later, Handel staged it in London. Controversy from the Church of England continued to plague Handel, yet the King of England attended the performance. As the first notes of the triumphant Hallelujah Chorus rang out, King George rose. Following the royal protocol, the entire audience stood, too, initiating a tradition that still exists today. Everyone stands when the Hallelujah Chorus is presented.

Handel's last days... Days before Handel died, he expressed his desire to die on Good Friday, “in the hopes of meeting his good God, his sweet Lord and Savior, on the day of his Resurrection.” He lived until the morning of Good Saturday, April 14, 1759. His death came only eight days after his final performance, where he had conducted his masterpiece, Messiah. He was buried in Westminster Abbey and left his sizeable estate to his niece, who lived in Germany.

The Chancel Bells version of this magnificent work was presented as a Prelude on Easter morning 2009. The full choir rehearsed this piece weekly since October to present it to the congregation praising the Glory of God. As their director, I want to thank them for their hard work. Personally, I want to continue the tradition and stand to applaud their efforts. Well done!

Bells and Choir Rehearsals - The Chancel Choir and Chancel Bells rehearsals will continue until the first week of June. Perhaps you thought of joining us? We would love to have you! Rehearsals are on Thursday evenings – Bells at 6:30 p.m. and Choir at 7:30 p.m.
