the Messenger

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The kingdom of heaven is like what happened one night when ten girls took their oil lamps and went to a wedding to meet the groom. Five of the girls were foolish and five were wise. The foolish ones took their lamps, but no extra oil. The ones who were wise took along extra oil for their lamps. The groom was late arriving, and the girls became drowsy and fell asleep. Then in the middle of the night someone shouted, "Here's the groom! Come to meet him!" When the girls got up and started getting their lamps ready, the foolish ones said to the others, "Let us have some of your oil! Our lamps are going out." The girls who were wise answered, "There's not enough oil for all of us! Go and buy some for yourselves." While the foolish girls were on their way to get some oil, the groom arrived. The girls who were ready went into the wedding, and the doors were closed. Later the other girls returned and shouted, "Sir, sir! Open the door for us!" But the groom replied, "I don't even know you!" So, my disciples, always be ready! You don't know the day or the time when all this will happen.

- Matthew 25:1-13 (Contemporary English Version)

How often does life work out the way that we want it to? I can think of many examples where the plan that I had envisioned for some meeting, event, or decision failed to happen the way that I foresaw. Sometimes I feel like a victim of "Murphy's Law." The observation on life that says, "If anything can go wrong, it will." It's as if the circumstances that we find ourselves in are random and beyond our control, leaving us feeling like we are a cog in some giant, cosmic machine. It's as if we were pawns in some game of random chance where God does indeed roll dice in deference to Einstein's famous assertion to the contrary. We are just a number in the vast universal "bureaucracy of life."

But in Matthew we see Jesus telling us a story about a typical day in the life of a community in the Palestine of his day. In Matthew 25:1-13 we hear the "Parable of the Ten Bridesmaids" which relates the story of ten maids waiting for the bridegroom to arrive. Unfortunately, things don't work out the way the bridesmaids had planned. The groom is delayed and they are forced to wait for him. Five of the bridesmaids have planned ahead and are prepared for the delay with extra oil for their lamps, while the other five are forced to search for oil and miss the party. Jesus is commenting on the need for preparedness, for we neither know the day nor the hour of his return, the Second Coming. This story is meant to illustrate the need for keeping alert and ready at all times in face of the final judgment that will take place. The sixteen verses immediately preceding this parable also urge us to be watchful and to keep alert. Jesus is reminding us that being a Christian is about the need for preparing our hearts and our minds to receive God as a visitor everyday.

In this parable we can see the oil for the bridesmaids' lamps as a symbol. How much better can we understand the story if we substitute the Word of God for the oil the bridesmaids are carrying. As Warren Wiersbe says in his commentary on the New Testament, "The church should be holding on to the word of life in this dark and wicked world. We need to keep the word of his patience and keep witnessing of the return of Jesus Christ." This story is meant to connect the listener to the very simple command of "Watch!" But couldn't this parable also be a comment of the state of our lives today? Is Jesus talking to us about the hectic frenzy that we all find ourselves in? Most theologians treat the young women who are the subjects of the story as if they should have known that the bridegroom was going to be delayed. However, only half of them were prepared for this eventuality. What if we treat this discourse not as a comment on the sovereignty of God, but as a comment on the methodology of God? Then this story takes on a whole new dimension. We know by the arrival of the bridegroom that God's will is going to be done, but now there is some unpredictability in the way that God's will is manifest. The plan is not as clear cut as we Sunday morning preachers would like to make it. There is not uncertainty in the timeline. We begin to recognize that our role in creating the kingdom here on earth can be affected by what we do with God's help.

The oil of the story, the Word of God, is now something that we can use to see through the chaos that is continually around us, and even more importantly that we can put to work in our lives to help bring about the Kingdom of God here on earth. Instead of us becoming "closet Christians" who spend all our time sequestered from the world around us, we are challenged to delve into God's Word to take it out to the dark and lonely world in which we live. We are to equip ourselves with all the extra oil that we can carry to make sure that our lamp and our witness are shining bright. We are reassured that God is the ultimate victor and in the end will be in control, but we are also challenged to be prepared with the Word when course corrections and adjustments need to be made in our precise calculations and future predictions.

The only certainty in modern life is uncertainty and change. Jesus is urging us to be ready for it with the oil of life and light, the Word. Change and chaos are inevitable, are you ready? Do you have a spiritual connection that will help you weather the storm? Now is the time to build that relationship. Now is the time to get to know Jesus a little bit better. Now is the time to receive God's grace. Now is the time to let the Holy Spirit work in your life for the greater good. Now is the time.

RPUMC will be helping the effort by hosting a community-based Question Assistance Center (QAC) that will aid families and individuals in filling out their census questionnaire. It is our goal to help insure everyone in Delaware is counted.
