December 21<sup>st</sup> of this year is the winter solstice, the shortest day of the year for those of us in the northern hemisphere. I always find the contrast between the melancholy I feel during these short days and the wonder and joy of Christmas to be profound. I long so desperately for Christ to revisit our tired and broken world, yet I dread the dreariness and the sluggishness that the lack of sunshine brings to my heart. I've often thought how interesting it would be to celebrate Christmas in Australia where everyone wears shorts and tee-shirts, goes to the beach, and "throws another shrimp on the barbie" on one of the longest days of their year. What a disconnected feeling that would be to have Christmas in 90° weather when I am so used to the way things are. A drastic shift like that would make it feel more like the 4th of July than the day we celebrate Christ's birth.

These kinds of unusual Christmas thoughts also invite me to reflect on the people all around us who are feeling their very own sense of disconnection this year. The heartache caused by the loss of a close family member or spouse, a move in the last few months, or a change in marital status. All of these changes can turn the holidays of Christmas and Epiphany that we love so dearly into something that mirrors Elvis' Blue Christmas. I know because I've been there too. The Christmas after my first marriage dissolved was very hard for me. I was in South Carolina, many miles from home, and I was miserable. Even when I did get home for a few days right around Christmas, it was tough to shake the isolation and failure that plagued me. But the presence of my family and the love that we shared that year made all the difference. They reminisced and cried and laughed and fed and gave and hugged and loved me right out of my *deep blue funk*. That year I received a gift that I could never repay, and I know that it was given just to me so that I could be whole. Much like Jesus, the "Light of the World" was given to us at Christmas so that we could be whole and never have to walk in darkness again. God knew about humanity's *deep blue funk* and responded with a gift that we could never repay.

This year I want to challenge us as a community of faith to do two things. First, to pray for those persons who we know have lost loved ones, relocated, or have gone through a divorce. Second, I want each of us to reach out to at least one person going through a difficult time and perform an act of love for them. It can be as simple as making a phone call to see how our friend is doing, or we can include this special person in some of our plans, or we can take him or her a small present or a meal. The actual act itself doesn't matter as much as the thought and time that goes into it. Our friends and loved ones need to know, in a tangible way, that we love them. It's that simple. So who are you going to pray for and reach out to? What are you going to do to say, "I love you"? I think you'll find that the experience of reaching out blesses you as much as the person to whom you are reaching out. Which brings me to my final Christmas paradox -- isn't it funny how the more we give love away, the more that we find out how much love we really have?

May this Christmas be the merriest one ever.

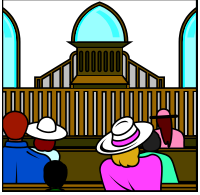

## ***Laity Enlightenment***

After Thanksgiving it's a mere 30 days until Christmas! The holiday hustle and bustle can get the better of us if we let it. All of the decorations and preparations take time which always seems to be in short supply. Just take a minute to think about the things you do in the time between Thanksgiving and Christmas. What do you spend your time doing and with whom? What do you remember about each Christmas?

My most memorable Christmases became such naturally because something significant occurred during that time. As a child, I remember when I got a brand new, pink and white Schwinn bicycle. I was so proud of that bike! A few years later, the bike was stolen from in front of my aunt's house while I was inside visiting. I learned a few life lessons about the temporary joy and long-lasting disappointment of placing too much value on material things. I also remember receiving an Easy Bake Oven. I loved taking requests from my family and producing special treats to their delight. This was the start of my most favorite hobbies: cooking and baking. As a young adult with two young children, my family and I moved into a newly purchased home and celebrated our first Christmas by decorating a tree that was later taken outside and planted in the front yard. Each year, we would decorate it with lights, having to add more and more strings of lights as the tree grew. The tree is still there in my front yard about 27 years later. It's too big to decorate like I used to, but it continues to remind me of how much everything changes over time. In more recent years, I served lunch around the holidays at the Emmanuel Dining Room on Jackson Street in Wilmington. It affects me deeply each time to see so many men, women and children who are hungry, cold and struggling to survive everyday. Because of that experience, I will always feel exceptionally fortunate and grateful to God. Seven years ago my father, Dick Jackson, passed away three days after Christmas, and the significance of that loss is revisited by his loved ones every year at that time. And I'll never forget last Christmas when Dave Rogers formally proposed to me on Christmas Eve. Disappointment, happiness, gratitude, sadness, and joy are all part of my Christmas memories and part of all our everyday lives.

Now that I'm older and have grandchildren, I have a fresh perspective on Christmas time. I am spending less time decorating around the house and more time sharing dinner or visiting with my friends, my brothers and their families, my children and grandchildren. I still struggle with the hectic nature of things this time of year and occasionally have to remind myself about why we celebrate Christmas; the birth of Christ, God's love, and ultimately our salvation sent to us in the form of a child.

This year I encourage you to do something different; just one thing different. Maybe volunteer at a soup kitchen or work to collect contributions to your favorite charity. Bake something for a friend or neighbor and invite them to join you at church on Sunday. Buy a new coat or hat and donate it to Brighter Day Ministries. Get together a small group and go caroling at a nearby nursing home. Help with Meals on Wheels or have lunch with a person who is alone or confined to their home. Offer to drive someone to the store or decorate a small tree for an elderly friend. Come to church at 9 A.M. and sit in on a Sunday school class or sit in the sanctuary to pray for others and be with God. There are countless ways to do one small thing different this Christmas that might well make a very big impact in your life and the life of someone you touch.

Consider what you can do with your time, talents, love and kindness and be generous with them. Let Christ's light shine through you to be a blessing to others this Christmas and you will surely be blessed in return. Merry Christmas!
